

#### Headteacher's Message



Dear Families,

Although it has been a short half term, it has been a busy one! Our after school programme has got off to a great start and it has been wonderful to see so many children pursuing their interests beyond the school day. Most clubs are full but there are some spaces remaining in Dance and Singing.

We are delighted to share that we have also opened a peaceful library club at lunch time for children to access for reading and reflection.

This week, children enjoyed End of Unit Quizzes, testing their knowledge across the curriculum - science, history, geography and more. Year 3 also got to find out about a range of creatures in their Zoolab Workshops, everyone learnt about how to safe online as part of Safer Internet Day and Years 3 and 4 developed their financial awareness in MoneySense Workshops.

For health and safety, it is really important that children wear appropriate clothing during PE lessons. This includes trainers (plain black) and jogging trousers or shorts (no dresses or skirts). **Tracksuits must not be worn**; on cold days children are able to wear their school jumpers.

Also, to keep children safe, they must not be left unsupervised in the playground before the start of the school day. Please remain with your child until members of the staff team are in the playground areas to supervise them and to ensure they enter school safely for registration. Recently, there has been a rise in the number of KS2 children in the playground area or on Sycamore Road, without an adult. This raises safeguarding concerns as only Year 6 pupils, with parental consent, are allowed to walk to school alone.

Next term, we are looking forward to further Natwest MoneySense workshops for Year 5. We are delighted that there will be volunteers from Natwest Bank joining the sessions, maybe inspiring our children to consider a career in banking in the future! We will also be welcoming volunteers into school to clear our new orchard area, in preparation for planting fruit trees. School Uniform Policy and Expectations

Dear families,

Please can you ensure that your child has the correct uniform and P.E Kit. Children who attend Manor Park must wear uniform as shown in our school uniform policy.



# MONKEY

Also known as Monkey Cool, this platform aims to fill the gap left by Omegle (which has now shut down) by placing users in random video chats with strangers. Participants use their mobile number and Snapchat username to connect to the service, where they can make matches, message other people and join group chats. The mobile version has been removed from the App Store due to safety concerns, but iPhone owners can still access the site via their web browser. The app remains available on Google Play, where its listing claims that Monkey has more than 30 million users worldwide.

#### AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

WHAT ARE

THE RISKS?

The app claims to use AI to detect sexual content for activity that violates its policies, along with having a 24/7 moderation team. However, reports in the media continue to indicate that explicit content remains commonpiace on Monkey (including sexually graphic or violent material) and is therefore accessible to anybody who uses the app — including those aged under

#### IN-APP SPENDING

While Monkey is free to download, it nevertheless offers in-app purchases promising to unlock access to premium features. For example, users who wish to make use of 'Knock Knock chat' (Monkey's text-based messoging option), rather than the app's Chatroulette-style random video colling feature, will need to pay to be

#### CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

The obvious risk in accepting random video chat partners is that users cannot know what or who they will see on their next connection. Talking to strangers is, of course, potentially dangerous – especially or children who might be persuaded to meet up with these people offline. The app lets users find each other by location, increasing the chances of a child being matched with a stranger from their local area.

# INTRUSIONS ON PRIVACY

According to Monkey's privacy policy, personal information (such as name, profile picture and date of birth), user-contributed content (any photos, texts, videos and screen shots shared) and each user's browser and IP address are collected. That is a considerable ormount of data for Mankey to gather on its users – and all of this information is shared with third parties.

# Advice for Parents & Carers

#### DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Even if you're comfortable with your child using Monkey, it's still important to talk about the potential dangers. It's crucial, for instance, that young people recognise the risks that stem from video chatting with strangers; that they understand not to share identifying information (like their street or school name); and that they know what to do if they are exposed to inappropriate content.

#### RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASING

If your child is accessing Monkey via an Android device, you can prevent them from moking in-app purchases through the device's settings. If you do allow you child to use the site, we'd recommend that you enable this feature: young people have been known to spend significant amounts of money in their desire to unlock more features in apps such as this.

#### REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Monkey states in the safety section of its site that "people are given the power" and that, to a large extent, Monkey is "self-governing." If a user is exposed to sexually explicit or inappropriate content on the platform, they can select the 'police' empi in the top right corner of their screen to submit a report for Monkey's moderation team to review.

# SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child is spending too much time on Monkey – or that they may have been exposed to inappropriate or distressing content – it's important to watch for potential indications that they've been affected emotionally. They could be unusually irritable or unable to concentrate, for example, or failing to complete their homework or even to eat regular medis.
















#### Attendance Procedures and Autumn and Winter Illness
